













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Steve Heald, a GVACS member has provided us with an opportunity to show certain cars at the 200th anniversary of the forming of Wayne County. Please see Steve's memorandum as follows:

Some of you may have heard that 2023 is the 200th anniversary of the founding of Wayne County. One event being planned to celebrate the bicentennial is a car and boat show to be held this coming July 22nd at the Sodus Bay Yacht Club.

The car portion of the show is an invitational event that will focus on the evolution of the automobile, and will be open to cars with its year ending in "3" (e.g. 2023), one for each decade. The goal is to have one car from each decade covering 1903 through 2023, with a variety of cars, trucks, sports cars, military, etc. highlighting how the automobile has changed over the past 120 years.

eginning in the 1950s all of the "small" auto companies came under everincreasing financial pressure. It was a new era where customers wanted a restyled car every model year. This new trend was augmented by

mechanical innovations that set the bar far beyond the financial capability of the low volume, small car companies. By the 1970s all of the independent car companies had passed into the great-beyond

superseded Nash Motors.

into the great-beyond except for the American-Motors-Corp, (AMC) that

What happened in the 1950s was an automotive tragedy, cars are expensive to bring to market. Consider that an automobile has upwards of 14,000

parts without even considering the myriad of small sub-parts making up a larger component; I.E levers and springs in the window mechanism, bolts and nuts on the starter. It is arguably the most costly, complex product ever put into

mass production; its manufacturing requires complex engineering, design and timing problems even beyond its huge overhead structure and marginal returns.

All these parts have to be engineered, priced, tooled and planned out to a cost and time budget. The small makers like Nash/AMC were always faced with the key question of how many units would be sold as opposed to how many would be needed to pay for the tooling. The product planners at a GM division would be dividing a \$500,000 bumper die set by a two million unit run for a tooling cost of \$.25 a bumper while the independents would optimistically

use a divisor of 200,000 cars. Their best case then was a \$2.50 tooling cost.

This simplification shows a ten times greater cost advantage for GM than for one of the independent companies and

would be multiplied over thousands of parts. One of the consequences of this would be a much longer life span for parts; the 1953 Studebaker bumpers were still in use at the end in 1964 as were the basic front fenders. Hudson at the end was using an engine

designed in the early thirties.

Studebaker was actually able to produce a very capable V8 in 1951; it was the only modern engine produced by the independent car companies until Packard fielded a V8 in 1955.



A little history is in order. Back in the day carmakers reveled in different approaches; why in 1930 the Cadillac division alone made a V-8 along with a V12 and a V16. Customer choices abounded. By 1950 General Motors was offering customers the choice of a flathead six or eight-cylinder car (Pontiac); an overhead valve six (Chevrolet & GMC), an overhead

valve V-8 (Cadillac & Olds), an overhead valve straight eight (Buick) and all kinds of permutations of

Packard its Pan-America, Studebaker had Hawks and the Avanti and Kaiser its Darrin and Henry-J.

2, 3 or 4 speed automatic transmissions. That's five dramatically different engine configuration designs just at GM. The GM philosophy seemed to be that they could provide whatever engine & transmission combination a customer wanted in one of their divisions.

It's of interest that none of the small car companies could afford to develop their own automatic transmission until Packard, late in the mid-fifties.

So, In the 19-fifties General Motors was a colossus that straddled the automotive market setting the standard for styling and mechanical innovation that the rest of the industry had to dance to.

The small companies had no

chance as they sought out a niche in the market to hide in.

By 1976 only American Motors was left, Hudson, Willys, Packard, Studebaker, Kaiser were gone. Each of these proud-old companies had designed a "niche" product that would keep them in the automotive





American Motors dabbled in Muscle cars like the Javelin and AMX with some success but they needed a "Hero" car. In 1970 they marketed the Gremlin (on April 1st, LOL) which was widely panned but made significant cash for AMC.

Management opted to swing for the fences with a new "cleansheet-of-paper" design. The end result was the Pacer, a \$65Mil investment that entered the market in 1975, this kind of money was a huge stretch for

AMC. It's a surety that the development of Hudson's "Jet" for half that amount was on their mind; it was a spectacular, company killing failure, Yikes.

I think that AMC wanted their new car to be different, not

only just another new model but a car that would

drive a new design trend. The VW bug was very different from anything else in the marketplace, a one word description of the VW-bug would be "impertinent". The VW was unusual and bathed in cuteness, like a new puppy.

The Pacer design aimed for

business. Hudson had the its Jet, Willys its Aero, Different / Cute. At the Pacer's launch, it seemed

that AMC had threaded the needle, the dealer's showrooms were crowded.

In the second year, around 120,000 Pacers were sold; a good outcome for AMC, but cracks were beginning to show. The engine was slow, heavy and

unresponsive, the car took over 14 seconds to get to 60mph, and it only clocked around 16mpg, less if you used the air conditioning, which you did because of all that glass. It was hard to park because of the width and weight, and mechanical faults were beginning to show through. The elec-



trics were proving unreliable and there were reports of the steering seizing and failing due to the extra weight and strain imposed on the steering rack by the heavy engine.

Alas, the Pacer's platform was far too heavy and space inefficient to compete with the downsized Big Three cars of the late-70s. As a case in point, the 1976 Pacer weighed more than a 1978 Chevrolet Malibu two-door coupe (by roughly 110 pounds) and a Ford Fairmont two-door sedan with a six-cylinder engine (by more than 500 pounds).

In 1977, a two-door station wagon was added to the lineup, complete with roof rack and woodgrain-vinyl options, and in 1978 the front end received a minor facelift with a taller grille opening. The AMC 304 CID V8 also became available that year along with the 232 and 258 CID inline sixes. But by then, sales of the offbeat vehicle were slowing dramatically as the enthusiastic but limited demand was met. The best

year was 1976 with 117,000 cars sold, and by 1980, the Pacer's final year, volume dwindled to only 1,746 units.

Until a few years ago, the Pacer stuck in the Automotive Freak Show, scoring high in "Worst Car Ever"

lists and books with titles "Lemon!" like "Automotive Atrocities — the Cars We Love to Hate", often accompathe nied by **AMC** Gremlin, so much that one gets almost disappointed when its name misses from such a compilation. However, times are a-changing.

Today, cars from the 1970s are dated technology, and many are gone for good. Lately, the Pacer is seen differently: as a design icon of its time, and as what it could have been. On the other hand, part of the fun in owning a collector car is in having a machine that isn't like everything else, and the Pacer definitely checks that box.

I must confess that I am a fan of the different, somewhat wacky, attempts at "unique" enough to attract buyers but not so different as to scare buyers away. I think the Pacer is right in the middle between unique and scary; I would own one but there is no chance of recovering any cash spent on achieving "show-quality" so it remains a historic footnote in automotive history.

A Pacer at a car show always draws a crowd, and not many cars have this talent. So, AMC-Pacer is gone but by no means forgotten.
