
The tunnel under the Erie Canal in Medina, NY was one thing on my bucket list that I finally checked off! Check out the pictures on page 14 & 15.

Jeep, The Improbable Survivor

illys Overland had struggled on the fringes of the US Auto market for so long that like a sneak thief it had developed a sixth sense for survival. It maneuvered itself into position to be the one company that's name was forever associated with Jeep. They were hungrier than Ford because unlike

Ford they really had no real "next act" postwar product plans. So it came to pass that by 1942 Willys

were planning a civilian Jeep, the CJ. They began using scarce assets to buy ads promoting a main street USA version of the Jeep as the perfect postwar vehicle; the ads always featured the Willys name prominently lest anyone think that the Jeep was a Ford

product. The New York Times had a back page story in May of 1943 that the Fair Trade Commission agreed that Willys-Overland claimed to have created

the Jeep, that was false but by then Willys had appropriated title to the Jeep name in the public's perception; perception became reality. A short, nasty court fight in 1943 left Willys free to create the image of Willys Jeep, the only Jeep. Its ironic that the

very successful Jeep has helped prop up a total of five struggling companies in various stages of financial difficulty.

It took until 1950 for Willys to obtain the United States Trademark Registration for the Jeep name.



Since then, ownership of the Jeep trademark, which is also registered internationally, passed from Willys-Overland to Kaiser to Motors American Corporation, and recently, most to Chrysler Corporation. Today, Chrysler Corporation owns over


1,150 registrations for the Jeep. trademark throughout the world. As Chrysler passes through the current bad times its interesting to note that the trademark for the Jeep name is listed as Chrysler's major asset.

At wars end Willys had fully developed the civilian Jeep and began an ad blitz

marketing it's prowess to the returning GIs and farm-

ers. It was little removed from the Army version and as familiar as rain to the GIs. The new model designation was CJ-2A and it remained virtually unchanged until 1953 when Willys-Overland sold out to Kaiser Industries for the bargain price of \$60 Million. An updated model was already in the works at the

time of the sale so Kaiser didn't need immediate cash for face-lifts.



we didn't realize though is the fact that this money would make hardly a ripple in that market." By '53 he was looking for a way out and badly needed a cash cow to mitigate his losses. Jeep had a steadily profitable, niche business that needed little invest-

ment as it was blessed with infrequent model changes. Today we would state it as, "nice cash flow, little need more investment, priceless."


A little background on the fifties is in order. By 1953 all of Independent the automobile companies could see the

"Grim Reaper" on the horizon. Studebaker was the most threatened as they continued to insist on mimicking the "big three" as a full -line manufacturer.

Studebaker plunged into the 53-model year with one great product

and a series of also-rans. Trucks were an expensive distraction that siphoned off talent and money in a hopeless quest to gain market share. Their trucks were different and pretty but never achieved enough market volume to make them viable. Studebaker trucks larger than pick-ups were produced at a Rolls Royce run-rate, essentially hand made then usually sold at a loss.

At the same time that Studebaker had a little of the Government contract cash still on hand from 1950 and 51 when Government contracts were 36% of their revenues; Jeep was for sale and the contracts had ended. They might have purchased Jeep, It was a very steady cash cow and they could have snatched it away from Kaiser. The basic Jeep line had continued with only small, incremental changes for 15 plus years. Jeeps were always profitable and repeat business was assured by its cult like following. A Stu-



debaker-Jeep line would have produced a predictable profit instead of the predictable loss that their truck division delivered.

The Aero Willy's sedan by Jeep could have been Studebaker's Rambler; it was a good design well before its time hampered by a lack of dealers. Kaiser

quickly dropped it to eliminate competition with their own Henry-J.

What might have been?

If one gazes long enough at charts and graphs it should be possible to pinpoint a company's position and chart a favorable response. Alas Studebaker and in fact all the Independents missed the curve and would be well on their way to extinction



within the decade. The best managed of the lot was Nash and they put great effort into the creation of a consortium of all the minor automobile companies that were left. The effort floundered due to the various egos involved. No CEO wanted to cede authority so they all perished; simply falling out of competition

with a wease, not a bang. I'll use Studebaker as an example solely because they fielded a full line of product, trucks to economy cars.

In 1950 Studebaker was a player with profits and market share. If they had plotted a different course



then we might still have Studebaker dealerships to visit. Management foresight might have noticed a few facts.

- --GM alone had a 50+% market share
- --GM had been able to afford a 13- year development phase for an automatic transmission
- --In 1949 GM fielded two very different and modern OHV V-8s without even breathing hard. Within the 50s decade all GM products would sport modern engines quite different for each car.

- --Trucks would start to become stylish in the El-Camino mode.
- --After roughly 14 years Government contracts were ending; a major revenue hit for Studebaker at roughly 36% of revenues.
- --The end of war era when you could sell anything was ending
- --The major companies would defend their market share with bloody discounts
- -- Looking forward you could see that horsepower would become a selling tool; big block V-8s were certainly coming as the Federal Interstate project began.
- --GM was already expending large sums developing a fuel injector system and their "showcars" surely defined rapid model changes.


--The long pent up demand for cars caused by the depression and the war was bursting into exuberant excess in the early 50s. Expressways were being built. They led to new suburbs, drive-in theaters and restaurants that allowed patrons to remain in their comfy cars when eating.


But the 1950s and '60s were also a shaking out period for the manufacturers. Ten car companies became four. The casualties included Studebaker, Nash, Kaiser-Frazer, Hudson, Packard, Willys and Crosley. The powerful influence of Harley Earl for "lower, longer, wider" and with flashy fins beat down those who could not compete.

The Judges Honor Society was established on October 5, 2010 to honor outstanding judges that are no longer able to actively



participate in judging. The Society is open to judges who value the friendship of the judging community and want to continue those friendships and continue to be an important part of the community. AACA recognizes how important it is to have these judges continue to be a part of the judging scene so that we do not lose their friendship, knowledge and expertise.

The requirements to join the Honor Society include the following: 1. You must be a member in good standing of AACA. 2. You must have at least ten years of experience as an active judge. 3. You must have at least 50 judging credits.

You must fill out an application to apply for membership in The Judges Honor Society, and submit it to the Chairman of the Honor Society. The Chairman is currently Arthur Bolton. You can obtain an application by emailing me at vickibolton@bellsouth.net. The nominee will be notified in writing of acceptance. Once a nominee is accepted, the new member will receive an Honor Society shirt and pin. The new member will be acknowledged at the next judge's breakfast that they attend.

Honor Society members are encouraged to attend judging school and take CJE's. Honor Society members should try to take at least one school per year. Honor Society members will have a dedicated table at the Judges breakfast.

Honor Society members will continue to receive judging credits for meets that they attend, credit for attending an annual school and credit for one CJE per year. They are also eligible to receive a new certificate and judging pin when they reach a new judging plateau. Honor Society members are encouraged to enjoy the meet, see the cars and thank the owners for bringing their cars to the meet.




