Windshield wipers: \$1,900 for a set of 2. Yearly fluid service - oil, filter, etc. \$25,000. There are six drain plugs in the engine; most are inaccessible unless you remove major body panels.

Wheel rims 'expire' and must be replaced every 10,000 miles. Cost - \$50,000 for a set of four. Every five years, the fuel tank must be replaced at a cost of \$44,000. Five-year maintenance costs total



\$385,000. Insurance varies but is typically in the \$50,000/year range.

In my 15 years serving on your Board of Directors I have seen many changes in our


hobby, in our club and in our people and the vehicles that they show. I like to think that these changes have been positive.

Always remember, "you can always count on change unless you are dealing with a vending machine."



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


EARLY CAR SAFETY A Murray Stahl Muse

n today's world we bop around in cars that are designed closer to "lockboxes" than the rickety motorized buggies of the early 1900s. Until around 1905 the primary mode of daily transportation in the US had four legs and ran on hay. Horse-drawn carriages and buggies cost as little as \$25 to \$50 and could be driven by almost anyone, even children. By early 1910, the number of automobiles on the road surpassed the number of horsedrawn "vehicles." The Automobile Club noted that in 1909 there were 200,000 motorized cars in the United States. Seven years later, by 1916, there were 2.25 million. It is a great understatement to say that this rapid change outpaced the creation of safety measures and laws to regulate the new traffic.

It was a numbers game; In the first 10 years of the 1900s, there were no stop signs, traffic lights, lane lines, brake lights, driver's licenses, posted speed limits, the list goes on and on.

Safety was simply not part of an early drivers thought process early as cars were essentially buggies without horses and were just about as fast as the horsedrawn they were replacing. In the Summer of 1905,







the authorities in Kansas set an 8 to 14 MPH speed limit and instructed the police to shoot out the tires of speeders!

It was a circus and cried out for some regulative change. I'm a closet Libertarian that still fumes over the seat-belt law, letting the Government tell me what I must do with **MY** body; the next step is ordering you to get a permit to shampoo your hair in the shower; it is the most dangerous place in your home! I do use seatbelts as logic dictates their benefits but think that this regulation was just wrong but I digress.

It was obvious that as more and more "Motor-Cars" hit the road at ever higher speeds some "Safety" rules were needed. It's easy to forget that the "new" Motor Car drivers were used to horse drawn wagons that meandered along at 2.5 to 4 miles an hour and the new Motor Buggies could double that. An 8 to 10MPH ride was reckless and scary. The changeover from Horses was

of the 1900s, there were no stop signs, traffic lights, lane lines, brake lights, driver's licenses, posted speed limits or windshield wipers.

Think of yourself as a 17-year-old, used to traveling at 3MPH who suddenly can drive at three times that speed in a vehicle that was as High-Tech as that newly introduced typewriter. As you get underway you experience the powerplant's train-like movement. It had to be like magic.

The cars themselves resembled the 2.5 MPH wooden wagons more than what we would consider as cars. By today's standards, tires, brakes, handling and lights were rudimentary at best. It was a decade before the new industry settled on a common steering wheel. The most important consideration with regard to driving any horseless carriage is its ability to stop, and as most brass cars have braking action on the rear wheels only, and their tires are skinny enough to have the same footprint as a babies-shoe, there just isn't going to be a whole lot of traction there for panic-stops. Secondary to poor braking performance, but still perfectly capable of killing a brass-car driver dead as Elvis, is the matter of potholes. Those asphalt holes lurking in springtime shadows can rattle your vertebral column clear up to your molars, and a deep one can smash a brass car's wooden spokes to kindling. If that happens to a front wheel, an end-over-end tumble is likely. In today's cars you may be able to see a deep pothole in time to swerve and avoid, but the word, "swerve," does not exist in the horseless carriage lexicon.

Then there are other things like a tippy, high center of gravity and of course, side and frontal crash protection in any brass car is practically non-existent. Our modern cars have "crumple" zones designed in while the early motorized wagons were wood with thin sheet metal nailed on top. The early car designers were completely absorbed with just getting their motorized buggy to travel at all; safety was not on their agenda. That's why even the simplest safety features were missing. As late as 1939 there were cars being sold with the same traverse spring arrangement as the farm wagons used in the civil war.

The early cars had plate glass window panels and as late as the early 1930s some popular cars had the gasoline tank placed in the cars front end right over the driver's lap. Also in the 1930s, a few safety thoughts evolved into a market response as auto makers actively promoted new safety improvements such as all-steel bodies and hydraulic brakes. Auto makers now assured motorists that modern cars were completely safe, and industry representatives contended that improving roads, licensing drivers, and regulating traffic was the key to preventing accidents. Seat energy-absorbing belts, steering columns, and padded dashboards were not installed, even though all of those devices had been invented by the 1930s. Things moved slowly in the US; we were more than a decade behind Europe in the adoption of disc brakes and Ford was 10-full years behind its peers on the use of hydraulic brakes. Slow was the word of the day right up to the 1960s.


The D. W. Price Sr. Memorial Trophy - Established: 1965


