
I'm thankful for ALL our members, we are a unique, diverse, and yet connected group of individuals who share a love of antique cars. Thank you for making this club what it is!

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A Message From Your President Don Dear




Looking ahead to 2021- some



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1932 Packard Light 8 - 900 Series submitted by Dave Stein

n the winter of 1954 I bought a second car for \$350. It was a 1932 Packard 900. I never thought of it as an antique, just a car that only needed some fix-ups.

Edgar Phillips was trying to trade in the Packard and couldn't make a deal with Churchville Motors. I was driving by and saw the car and made a deal to buy it.

He was the architect who helped construct the Little Theatre and the Manhattan restaurant.

In the cold winter of '54,

one of my trucks broke down that I used in my family's bakery business and I had to use the '32 Packard as a truck. I loaded it with bread and rolls to

make my delivery for the day. I delivered my order to the Little Chateau restaurant at about 4 AM.

While I was making the delivery, I heard someone shout out "Who owns the Packard?" I look around and saw the man who was talking to me. I replied, "I do."

He asked if it was for sale, and if it was, would I take \$500 for it. Without hesitation I said, "SOLD!"

he knew my father and he could not take advantage of me. My car was worth much more, to my surprise.


He said his name was Allan Nagle and I should join GVACS. Allan then said it would be worth \$1,000 someday!

adopted. You only had to feed them when they were working and they stank much less. Cars were faster than horses which sped everything up, changing our

society forever; topping it all off cars allowed enormous freedom of movement

So, the car became the hero of the day, a solution for the pollution mess in the cities. By 1910, the number of cars on New York City's roads had surpassed the number of horses. Buyers found cars to be cheaper to own and operate and much more efficient; not to mention more sanitary. One and all praised the automobile for its economic sustainability and ability to reduce traffic. And so, by some

miracle, the sanitation problem that had long plagued city planners disappeared just before parking all the cars became a new problem.

We now know that as automobiles proliferated, they contributed to their own pollution problems but Compared to 1970 vehicle models, our new cars,

SUVs and pickup trucks are roughly 99 percent cleaner for common pollutants (hydrocarbons, carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxides and particle emis-

sions), and New heavy-duty trucks and buses are roughly 99 percent cleaner than 1970 models.

It seems to me that for every problem, science produces a solution but that solution seems always to have unintended consequences. news is now full of "electric Car" solutions but this "solution" will require massive changes in our electrical grid and modern lifestyle where you can get into a car and travel 250 miles without a worry about getting there,

heating or cooling the car or finding fuel. In my opinion EVs will remain a niche vehicle for quite some time in spite of the ever-present breathless hype.




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Secretary's Report - November 2020

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

At its meeting on November 18, 2020, the Board of Directors...

- ... approved the minutes of the October 7, 2020 meeting of the Board of Directors.
- ... approved the Treasurer's report.
- ... Board approved disposing of financial records that have been previously audited and keeping records from the last five years on file.
- ...noted that membership currently stands at 107.
- ...noted that Membership Chair, Nancy Huffman submitted information to AACA regarding the Kirkham Award which recognizes a AACA region for the most new members in a year.
- ...noted that President, Don Dear AACA received notice from AACA regarding a military membership given to a local person whom we may wish to contact about joining GVACS.
- ...heard a report from Membership Chair, Nancy Huffman that she received notice from AACA that our annual Roster report (formerly due March 1) will now be due January 31. GVACS members are strongly encouraged to pay their 2021 GVACS dues by December 31 so they will continue to be recorded on the 2021 roster we submit to AACA. (Note, we are transitioning to changing our fiscal year to be consistent with that of AACA (January 1 December 31). This will be addressed in the proposed revisions to the GVACS By-Laws.) Again, to facilitate consistency with AACA recordkeeping, please pay your 2021 GVACS dues by December 31, 2020.
- ...noted that Board received confirmation of meeting dates for 2021 indoor meetings at the church. They are reflected on our activities calendar in this issue
- ...noted that in reviewing the activities calendar, COVID-19 continues to impact our planning. The most immediate concern is the Holiday Party and election of officers scheduled for December 13, 2020. Because Shadow Lake Golf and Country Club is in a "Yellow Zone", they can only accommodate 25 people. If, after Thanksgiving, they move to an "Orange Zone" status, they will close. Reservations for our party are at 30. None have been received for the past two weeks. The Board also noted that COVID-19 may impact activities for February and maybe March. We will monitor as the new year unfolds.
- ... approved cancelling the December 13, 2020 Holiday Party at Shadow Lake Golf and Country Club and further, since all current officers and directors have agreed to continue serving for another year, we will forego the election of 2021 Officers and Directors that was to take place at the Holiday Party.
- ... approved the proposed revisions to the By-Laws that will be presented to the membership for approval. (Recall that Chris Dear, Ann Neal and Nancy Huffman have reviewed the current GVACS By-laws. Minor changes are being proposed to update the By-Laws to be consistent with current practices. The primary proposal is to change our fiscal year from "February 1 to January 31" to "January 1 December 31. This change will be consistent with AACA's membership/fiscal year. As required by our current By-Laws the Board of Directors adopts a resolution amending the By-laws. The resolution is then put to the Members for a vote at the Annual Meeting or at any special meeting of the Members called by 30 days written notice for the purpose of amending the By-laws. Given the current calendar, this will occur in 2021 at either a special meeting or the 2021 Annual Meeting.)
- ...noted that the next meeting of the Board of Directors will occur at a date to be determined.

DID JA KNOW

....that when the Automobile Club of Rochester, sponsored the Glidden Tour in Rochester in 1950, the only ones from Rochester on the tour were Macy Jenkins in his 1926 Franklin and Seward Harris in a 1910 Flanders Touring. The Auto Club of Rochester was celebrating its 50th anniversary and this tour took place about a month before the Genesee Valley Antique Car Society was founded.

....that Mrs. Blanche Stewart Scott of Rochester, New York was one of the first woman drivers to drive from New York to San Francisco in 1910. She made the trip with a lady companion in a 1910 Overland tour car.

....that in 1921, Elmer Bassage raced a 1917 Maxwell on dirt racks against such drivers as Wild Bill Albertson and occasionally placed in the money. In one race, Albertson blew a tire, and went through a fence, so Elmer because of the dust and poor visibility followed him, thinking he was still on the course.

....that there are no Rochester celebrity cars in our club and that no old cars formerly owned by George Eastman, Edward Bausch or others have been preserved.

....that in some garage on East Avenue, there is still an electric car carefully hidden away, not for sale, but nevertheless saved.
